Mrs. Thompson, who was the second oldest of seven children, was a Nyack High School graduate, class of 1942. All but one of the seven children are active as foreign missionaries. A brother, George, serves as a pastor in Maine.

The Stebbins family has been in Vietnam for 42 years, Mr. Stebbins reported, starting with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Irving Stebbins, who first met on a skip bound for Vietnam in 1918.
